


Chairman's Message by Cathie Foster


- unnatural overgrowth of grape vines and cat briar in the parking lot

- St. Augustine grass from the muhly grass along the sidewalk from the delivery loop

I think it is fair to say that we were batting a thousand. We were certainly three for three that day!

Special shout outs to the following groups and people who made this RTP Work Day even better. Tampa Bay Estuary Program (TBEP) showed up with volunteers, a tractor, and a trailer to help us out. Wow! The tractor and trailer really made hauling debris so much easier and faster. Not only that, but TBEP provided a delicious Chick-fil-A lunch for everyone. Who doesn't love a little Chick-fil-A? 1 diced tomato


1 diced avocado (add when ready to serve)





Spring Birds, Bees, Butterflies, and Wildflowers

When I lived in northern states, spring was my favorite season. With the end of winter and the melting of snow, life took a remarkable turn. Flowers emerged from the once frozen ground and breeding birds returned to carry on their life histories. Many of us in Florida believe that we lack those seasons, but they exist here, too. You just have to look a bit closer, you don't get to watch snow melt, and you have to make your observations in natural areas - not in the surrounding urban jungle most commonly planted with tropical plants from other countries. Tropical plants generally don't change with the seasons, but native Florida ones do.

I still get excited by springtime because my landscape contains many of my favorite flowering trees and shrubs. As I write, my native plums and Walter's viburnums are in full bloom - heralding the start of spring as they do each year. My redbud is beginning to flower. Then it will be a succession of hawthorns, silverbells, and fringe trees. Our woodland wildflowers have also emerged from their brief winter dormant period. The various violets in our landscape have opened up. The jack-in-the-pulpits are also up and flowering as are the partridgeberries. In our small created wetland, golden ragwort are also back up and in full bloom.

The return of flowers also marks the return of bees and butterflies. They go hand-in-hand in a cycle that has existed since the fall of the Age of Dinosaurs, millions of years ago. Honey bees are again working my yard and it is fun to watch their work ethic in play. Many of our common native bees are not yet so noticeable, but they will be emerging shortly. We'll notice the various green metallic bees, the leaf-cutter bees, the long-horned bees and my favorites – the bumblebees. Most butterflies also have been largely absent these past two months, but they have started to return. Orange-barred and cloudless sulfurs are, once again, laying eggs on my privet cassia and the gulf fritillaries are doing the same on the passionvines. Over the past week, I've seen a variety of swallowtail butterflies as well.

We are right now at the beginning of the big switch in birds - from saying good-bye to the various migrants that spend the winters with us to saying hello to the migrants that only move through the area from their tropical wintering grounds to their northern breeding ones. Last week, I saw my first thrush, but the waves of colorful warblers, tanagers, vireos and grosbeaks are still a few weeks away. Each year, I spend time when I can on my deck with my binoculars to witness this passage. It is a hallmark of Florida spring that far too few of us notice.

Spring in Florida is not the same as it is in more-Northern states, but it is wondrous in its own right. Landscape your own yard to take more notice of it and venture out into our natural areas to feel it even stronger. Most of the wildflowers and flowering trees and shrubs in my yard are also in full flower at Brooker Creek Preserve. Now is a perfect time to explore!

• Our apiary is located on county-owned land north of Brooker Creek Preserve on property identified as Eldridge-Wilde.


- Our new storage shed is located near the Brooker Creek Education Center.

News from the Wildflower Garden

The garden is waking up after the winter rest. The first to bloom are the Florida violets and I saw many blooms in the middle of February. Next, we should see the lavender-blue stalks of the Lyreleaf sage.

In my last update, I mentioned that we are going to create a small bog garden in a corner of the Wildflower Garden. I have set our regular workday of April 28 as the day that we will start work on this project. Our normal work time is 8 to 10 am, but I would like to start at 8 am and work until noon on this day. We could use a few strong people with strong backs to help dig the

area for the bog. Please let Julia know if you can help us on the 28th. We already have the liner - donated by Chuck Parsons. Thank you for helping us out Chuck.

In early February a slider turtle dug a nest and laid her eggs at the edge of the garden near the boardwalk. There are orange flags warning us away from this area until the eggs

hatch.


If you can help in the garden, it will be greatly appreciated. Our workdays are on the last Saturday of each month from 9:00 -11:00 a.m. (winter hours). We change to summer hours (8:00-10:00 a.m.) in April. Bring your gardening tools, gloves, hat, bug spray and wear closed-toed shoes. We will provide breakfast snacks and coffee. Hope to see you there!



Pam's Tip

March is the time to prune, especially if you have plants that were damaged in our winter frost and freeze. By now you should see new growth sprouting on branches. If there is an area further out on the branch that is not sprouting, prune back to the new growth keeping in mind the overall

shape of the shrub. Always keep the top of any shrub slightly narrower than the bottom so that the whole shrub receives sufficient sunlight (see picture). This will help prevent the loss of leaves on the bottom of the shrub.

For the January 2018 topic of the Brooker Creek Preserve Reader's Club we had a Hemingway free-for-all. Our usual spirited discussion covered a good



bit of the Hemingway terrain. Of particular interest to me was one of his letters (from the Selected Letters 1917-1961) telling of the aftermath of the 1935 hurricane. Last September, the reader's club read an account of the 1935 hurricane. I felt Hemingway's letter was too graphic to share! In general, I hope I'm right in saying the consensus was that he was a good story teller but perhaps not to everyone's taste.

February was a bust in a way. The chosen book by Archie Carr was just not available in any library. I gather the purchase price was higher than most of the books we pick. And we were going to have guest who had worked with Mr. Carr (our own Barb Hoffman). So, door number two was a free for all: any book, magazine issue, ezine, that deals with Florida nature or history. I had a scheduling conflict so the Nichters ran the show (a big thanks to them).

From Kathleen: We had a wide variety of reading, and a fascinating discussion which ran well over our usual hour or so meeting. We started us off with "Nine Florida Stories" by Marjorie Stoneman Douglas. After some discussion on that, we moved on to "Geologic History of Florida" by Albert Hine and learned a lot of interesting facts about the geologic formation of our state. "The Gladesman" followed, by Florida author Tim Robinson which is part of a series he has written, and then "Alligator Candy" by Albert Hine. "Hitler's Soldiers in the Sunshine State" is all about the POW camps for German soldiers here in Florida during WWII. That was a piece of history most of us never realized. All the reading led to a lot of personal experience and personal observations from the group on the various subjects, which make our reading discussions so lively and informative.

Note, we are doing the free-for-all again in March. Pick any book, magazine issue, ezine, mezzanine, so forth, that deals with Florida nature or history and share your thoughts (and recommendations) about what you read. It's ok if several of you read the same thing (on purpose or by coincidence.) You may read a previous book that might have been read before you were a member of the group. We may in the future pick other topics to allow a potpourri of writings to read.

In April we do a book by one of my favorite authors, Jannise Ray: "Pinhook: Finding Wholeness in a Fragmented Land". This is a story of Pinhook Swamp in Georgia which affects waters coming into Florida. Please join us.
