





Return The Preserve

Brooker Creek Preserve is such a gift. The Friends of Brooker Creek Preserve are such an active element of the Preserve. To continue contributing to this wonderful relationship, we will be undertaking quarterly projects that will allow us to help "Return The Preserve". Quarterly, we will select a specific, defined area of the Preserve to return to its natural setting. This will entail work such as removing overgrowth and exotics to give the native plants their chance to live, flourish, and "shine" for our visitors. This will allow our guests to see more of Brooker Creek Preserve and appreciate even more of its true beauty.

Once a quarter, we will work with Brooker Creek Preserve personnel to select an area and define what needs to be accomplished, e.g. removal of grapevine overgrowth, removal of exotic plants, etc. The areas to be worked will be clearly identified and manageable for the anticipated level of participation, i.e we will keep this realistic in what we can accomplish, but we will ensure that we can see the rewards of our accomplishments. The area to be worked will be accessible by the volunteers. We will schedule a Saturday and reach out to our membership for participation and support. We will start early (8:00 am) and finish early (2:00 pm). Water will be provided.

Our first Return The Preserve work day will be Saturday, February 1st (Rain day will be Saturday February 8th, if needed). We will be removing the grapevine and other exotics from the main parking lot area. We'll meet in the main parking area at 7:45 am and get started by 8:00. Please bring clippers and work gloves. Pole saws will be available to help reach those hard to reach places. Dress appropriately. We will be in the thick of things (pardon the pun) in removing vines and overgrowth. Longs sleeves, jeans, and closed toe shoes are recommended. And don't forget your sunscreen and hats. Bottled water will be provided so we can stay hydrated. All of our members and volunteers contribute so much in so many ways. These work days will be for those members who enjoy the opportunity to donate some hands-on sweat equity to the Preserve. It will be for those members who enjoy lacing up their work boots and putting on their work gloves. It will give us a chance to really see the "before and after" of our efforts.

Our target, our goal, is a healthy, natural Brooker Creek Preserve. To "Return The Preserve" to its true beauty.

Hope You Had a Holly Jolly Christmas & Decked the Halls with Boughs of Holly

With Christmas just passed, I thought it fitting to reflect a bit on a few of the lyrics you most likely heard. All of us know the tunes above and have grown up hearing them at the holidays, but the history of holly at Christmas is one that dates back thousands of years. Holly was the sacred plant of Saturn and was used at the Roman Saturnalia Festival to honor him. Romans gave one another holly wreaths and carried them about decorating images of Saturn with it. Centuries later, in December, while other Romans continued their pagan worship, Christians celebrated the birth of Jesus. Early Christians used holly to decorate their homes during the Roman festival of Saturnalis to avoid persecution. Using the "Saturnalia" holly made them seemingly fit into the pagan culture of the times, but was really a code amongst themselves that demonstrated their Christian beliefs. As Christian numbers increased and their customs prevailed, holly lost its pagan associations and became a symbol of Christmas.

The use of holly in winter also predates the Roman invasion of the British Isles. The Druids believed that holly, with its shiny leaves and red berries stayed green to keep the earth beautiful when the sacred oak lost it leaves. They wore sprigs of holly in their hair when they went into the forest to watch their priests cut the sacred mistletoe.

The plant has come to stand for peace and joy; people often settle arguments under a holly tree. Holly is believed to frighten off witches and protect the home from thunder and lightning. In West England, it is said sprigs of holly around a young girl's bed on Christmas Eve will keep away mischievous little goblins. In Germany, a piece that has been used in church decorations is regarded as a charm against lightning. In England, British farmers put sprigs of holly on their beehives. On the first Christmas, they believed, the bees hummed in honor of the Christ Child. The English also mention the "he holly and the she holly" as being the determining factor in who will rule the household in the following year, the "she holly" having smooth leaves and the "he holly" having prickly ones. Other beliefs included putting a sprig of holly on the bedpost to bring sweet dreams and making a tonic from holly to cure a cough. All of these references give light to "decking the halls with boughs of holly."

Hollies belong to the genus *Ilex* and this genus is distributed worldwide, throughout a vast array of different climates. Most species make their home in the tropics and subtropics, but they have a worldwide distribution in temperate zones as well. The greatest diversity of species is found in the Americas and in Southeast Asia. Four species of holly are found in Brooker Creek Preserve.

> One of the most common species in the Preserve is dahoon holly (Ilex cassine). Dahoon is most common in wetland areas of the Preserve though it can do well in uplands and invades pinelands that are not regularly burned. Dahoon is an evergreen tree that eventually reaches a mature height of about 30-35 feet. Its shiny green leaves do not have the sharp points seen in the traditional American holly, but it shares the latter's smooth white bark. Dahoon often has multiple trunks and the branches are frequently quite crooked.

Preserve is **gallberry** (*Ilex glabra*). Gallberry is a short evergreen shrub, most commonly found in moist pine flatwoods. In certain locations, it can form large, dense colonies. The many stems make a thicket that is difficult to walk through. Gallberry has small, shiny, evergreen leaves. The female plants produce fruit that starts off rusty in color and eventually turns dark purple. As its common name implies, these fruit are quite bitter and are not eaten by birds until nearly everything else is gone.

Carolina holly (*Ilex ambigua*) is rather common in certain uplands of the Preserve. Numbers of them can be seen as you leave the Preserve parking lot and start to head up the "hill." There also is a large colony of them along the main hiking trail. These can be seen on both sides of the trail right after you leave the boardwalk over Brooker Creek and head up through the palmettos. Carolina holly is a deciduous shrub that rarely stands taller than 15 feet. At this time of year, it will be leafless, but the female plants with their showy red fruit will be unmistakable.

The least common holly within the Preserve, but a species that is common throughout much of Florida, is **yaupon holly** (*Ilex vomitoria*). Yaupon



has leaves that contain caffeine and, when roasted properly, makes a wonderful tea. Once used by Native Americans as a ceremonial drink, it was drunk in excess - to the point that caused vomiting; hence its Latin name. In nature, yaupon is extremely adaptable to growing conditions and can occur in nearly every type of habitat. It is an evergreen shrub that rarely stands taller than 25 feet.

Hollies are dioecious - a complicated word for a simple concept; hollies are among those plants that are either males or females. Only female plants produce the distinctive fruit that are still used as holiday decorations. Of course, males are needed to pollinate the female flowers in spring, but if you wish to use hollies in your landscape, make sure you plant mostly females. Do not attempt to plant only one holly and hope that pollination might just magically occur. Most hollies make long-lived, pest-free landscape plants and they have great wildlife value. And, they are a wonderful symbol of the holidays - a tradition that you can perpetuate.

Hikes Off the Beaten Path:

<u>March 16 - Sandhill Scramble</u> - The only true sandhills of Brooker Creek Preserve. This site is in the northern end of the Preserve and will feature an abundance of spring wildflowers.

<u>June 8 - Cypress Swamp Stomp</u> - Located in the central part of the Preserve, this site features orchids, ferns, and epiphytes. We might get wet, really wet, as we plunge into the depths of the swamp!

<u>Sept. 14 - In Search of the Catesby's Lily</u> - Located in the eastern part of the Preserve, we will search for the threatened Catesby's Lily. In so doing, we will see a profusion of beautiful fall wildflowers in full bloom.

<u>Dec. 7 - Interior Wildlands</u> - We will be in parts of the Preserve so remote that cell phones won't work, areas so pretty you won't believe you are in Pinellas County!


Potential Help for Brooker Creek Preserve?



Pinellas County Parks & Conservation Resources Department (PCR) has received a grant award of \$15,000 from the Florida Division of Forestry to spend towards the acquisition of a Fecon mowing head. PCR will match that amount to fund the balance of the Fecon head unit. The Fecon mowing head will be used in conjunction with existing tractor(s) at various parks & preserves to reduce vegetative overgrowth, especially in areas where prescribed burning may be difficult to perform. This includes mowing fire lanes along the perimeters of properties adjacent to residential areas and other sites which may help reduce the spread of potential wildfires. This grant agreement was just executed so PCR may move forward with acquisition. (Note from Editor: the Friends will be lobbying to have the mower head used at the Preserve more than anywhere else in the county. Use of this equipment is crucial to creating much needed fire breaks so more prescribed burns can occur. Many thanks to Deborah Chayet for writing and winning this grant for the County!)

Fiscal Year 2013 Accomplishments: Brooker Creek Preserve Resource & Asset Management Program October 4, 2013

- 1) Collaborated with Tampa BayWater to transfer water use permit and reporting requirements for long term wetland augmentation project
- 2) Completed contracted spraying for exotics at designated areas totaling \$26,472
- 3) Completed in-house preventative maintenance spraying at public-use areas
- 4) Completed fire ant control at select areas in advance of special events
- 5) Utilized volunteers to remove exotics at various properties, including BCP
- 6) Monitored and removed non native pest fauna
- 7) Completed seven prescribed burns totaling 164 acres
- 8) Maintained firebreaks during non-growing season and critical firebreaks during growing season
- 9) Supported numerous on-going mitigation projects
- 10) Collaborated with Duke Energy regarding mitigation to be completed on their private property within the Preserve
- 11) Initiated plans for replanting areas on BPCEEC/boardwalk mitigation site
- 12) Supported monitoring surveys conducted by volunteers, including members of CCC
- 13) Supported researchers and educators through administration of 11 Site-use permits
- 14) Initiated collaboration with FWC and University of Georgia researchers to develop study of deer population ecology in north Pinellas County
- 15) Continued bi-annual monitoring of Central Florida Old World Climbing Fern at sentinel sites in conjunction with other local agencies and The Nature Conservancy
- 16) Supported various non-profit groups including Friends of Brooker Creek Preserve
- 17) Provided GIS support related to BCP to other programs
- 18) Provided support for PCSO Environmental Lands Unit activities
- 19) Supported appraisal process and developed FCT management plan for the Wilde Lands Acquisition and Recreation Area as part of pre grant award requirements
- 20) Developed annual FCT stewardship report for the Brooker Creek Preserve Additions
- 21) Collaborated with County staff for CIP infrastructure and boardwalk projects

Pam's Gardening Tip

Even though plants in Central Florida stay green during the winter for the most part, they are still dormant. Many plants will grow very slowly or not at all during our coolest months. You will find that grass will not need to be mowed but every two to three weeks and will require less water. Grass that is allowed to grow a bit taller is less likely to suffer severe damage if there is a heavy frost or freeze. Fertilizer should not be applied to landscape plants or grass during the winter months and irrigation should be set to run every two weeks instead of every week.






Wreath-Making Class a Great Success!
