
### Music Jamboree: Feb. 4, 2018



# PAINTING ON YUPO: A WORKSHOP WITH TAYLOR IKIN

Come learn about painting on YUPO, a synthetic tree-free surface, with master artist/teacher, Taylor Ikin. Known as the "Queen of YUPO", paintings by Ms. Ikin are featured this winter in the exhibition *Into the Woods* in the Brooker Creek Preserve Auditorium Gallery. The workshop will provide a unique opportunity for artists at all levels, from beginner to experienced, to learn about this fascinating material that allows you to "artistically document a tree without tearing down a tree."

The class is limited to 20 students. Bring art supplies (brushes, preferred media: watercolor, acrylics, oils, or crayon, etc.) and a bag lunch. Drinks will be provided. Ms. Ikin will supply YUPO paper along with engaging instruction and artistic fun for all!

Taylor Ikin teaches YUPO workshops around the country and is on the faculty of the Dunedin Fine Arts Center. She is a past president and Signature Member of the Florida Watercolor Society and was juried into the National Watercolor Society annual exhibition in 2012. Currently Ikin is on the boards of the Gasparilla Festival of the Arts and the Leepa-Rattner Museum of Art, and has also served on the Board of the Arts Council of Hillsborough County. She has exhibited in museums and galleries around the country and *Fragile Florida*, a national touring exhibition of Ikin paintings commissioned by Hillsborough County ELAPP (Environmental Lands Acquisition and Protection Program), was featured at the Leepa-Rattner Museum of Art in 2005.






#### **Star Party!** Saturday, February 17, 2018 6:30 – 10:30 or so

# A Bit of Early History of Brooker Creek Preserve - Part 2

Several issues ago, I wrote about the early history of Brooker Creek Preserve. In this issue, I will add to that story. Brooker Creek Preserve did not begin as a conservation initiative. It was all about Pinellas County taking preemptive measures to prepare for the future development that was envisioned. Land that would someday become part of the Preserve was land intended for wellfields and trash disposal.

The runaway development that characterized Pinellas County for much of its early history met its first real obstacle in the growing public concern for the environment that began to seep into the nation in the mid-1960's and which culminated in the inauguration of the first Earth Day on 22 April 1970. What began here in Pinellas County as an organized concern over the dredging and incremental destruction of Boca Ciega Bay in the late 1960's, resulted in special legislation prohibiting its dredging several years later. Pinellas County responded in several ways to this cultural shift directed at concern for the environment. Of most impact to Brooker Creek Preserve

were the meetings and input that led to the so-called Red Flag Charrette published in 1972. This publication brought together city and County government officials, environmental interests, architects, planners, and private citizens to identify and prioritize environmental lands throughout the County for protection, potential acquisition, and environmental management. As an outgrowth of the 1972 Charrette, the citizens of Pinellas County supported the first referendum (of several) presented to them by the Board to increase ad-valorem taxes to purchase parkland and environmentally-sensitive land. In 1974, the Board established the Pinellas County Department of Environmental Management, for the first time employing a full staff of environmental professionals. All of these significant events occurred within the three years from 1972 to 1974.

The most obvious result of the Red Flag Charrette was that Pinellas County had very few options to meet preservation and conservation goals. The only viable one was to get serious about protecting the only large tract of undeveloped land that still remained - land in the northeastern corner of the County; the land that would become Brooker Creek Preserve.

The creation of the Environmental Management Department was a purposeful decision to separate lands that would be managed primarily for public use (the Parks Department) from lands that would be managed primarily for their environmental value. The Parks would emphasize passive (and some active) public uses within a natural-lands framework; the Preserves would allow for passive public uses as long as those uses did not cause damage to the integrity of the environmental resources. This is a major philosophical difference and one that has had to be revisited many times since.

The County already owned land in what is now Brooker Creek Preserve. The wellfields south of Keystone Road were not presently needed to generate potable water and the second incinerator idea was scrapped as unnecessary. It was at this time that the County met with officials of the Southwest Florida Water Management District (SWFWMD) for help in further land acquisitions. SWFWMD had funds from the state for this purpose thanks to the initial P2000 Program. Over the next few years, they purchased nearly all of the land from our southern border in the City of Oldsmar to the diagonal powerline. Pinellas County purchased key properties south of the current education center. Together, these lands constituted the nearly 5,000 acre Brooker Creek Preserve that was unveiled to the public in early 1991.

A lot has changed since that time. I was hired as the Preserve's first manager in 1992. I helped to establish the first Friends of Brooker Creek Preserve shortly after that. Together, we pushed to expand both the land and the programs that constitute what we have today. We've nearly doubled the acreage of what is now a contiguous conservation area. Some of this land has yet to be formalized within the recognized borders of Brooker Creek Preserve, but that seems a moot point right now as it is protected as conservation land. We have built one of the best facilities in Florida to help educate our residents about the importance of land conservation, we have built one

of the strongest citizen support organizations anywhere, and we have fought the battles that needed fighting and supported the programs that needed supporting.

What we know as Brooker Creek Preserve was forged by citizen



action in the 1960's and shaped by citizen action after its inception in 1991. It will remain healthy only through our continued involvement with County government and other governmental agencies. Your continued involvement is vital; never feel complacent about how important you are and continue to help us grow and prosper in the years ahead.

## News from the Wildflower Garden

Volunteers work to maintain this garden as a wildflower meadow that contains wildflowers native to Brooker Creek Preserve. Most of the plants have gone to seed and we let those seeds fall in hopes of increasing the number of wildflower plants in the garden. Not much is in bloom now, but the lyre-leaf sage should be sending up spikes of blue flowers in late January followed by violets. We took November and December off from working in the garden during the Holidays. Beginning in January or February we will be creating a bog garden in a corner of the Wildflower Garden so that we can plant some of the wildflowers that prefer more moisture. This will be a more labor intensive project that could use several persons with strong backs to help dig out the area.

If you are interested in helping maintain this garden, we meet in the morning of the last Saturday of each month. Our winter hours are 9 - 11 a.m. Bring gardening tools, gloves, a hat, and wear closed-toed shoes. We will provide breakfast snacks and coffee. We would love to have you come and join us on January 27 or February 24, 2018.

# Pam's Tip

I like to use winter months to survey my landscape and take note of what is working and what might need to be changed. I also like to consider how the landscape is friendly to wildlife since Brooker Creek Preserve bounds our back yard. The University of Florida/IFAS website has a compendium of great publications regarding landscaping for wildlife available on the Internet at: <u>http://edis.ifas.ufl.edu/topic\_landscaping\_for\_wildlife</u>.

Whether you wish to start small and just add a few wildlife friendly plants or you are thinking of redoing your landscape, you will be able to find good ideas in these publications. Keep in mind that pollinators are wildlife too! Happy Gardening.

While we all agreed most of them were recollections of enjoyable episodes there was a sadness implicit in how unrepresentative of the real concerns of the vast majority of most people living in that region.
